Theme: Walking Together



Season of Creation explanation

September 1, 1989, was proclaimed as a day of prayer for creation for the Eastern Orthodox Church by the late Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitrios I. It was embraced by other Christian European churches in 2001 and by Pope Francis for the Roman Catholic Church in 2015. Today, many Christian churches celebrate the Season of Creation beginning September 1 and concluding with the feast of St Francis, October 4. (About the Season of Creation, www.seasonofcreation.org)

Pope Francis' encyclical <u>Laudato Si</u> has placed emphasis on the need to care for creation and has moved the ecumenical movement forward. This month, we join

all people of good will in celebrating the Season of Creation.

"In walking together, we follow the road of Jesus, who walked with friends on the roads around Jerusalem. As He traveled the byways of his community, Jesus invited us to encounter God through God's presence in creation. Whether by considering "the lilies of the field", or the "grains of the wheat that falls to the earth," the spiritual journey of following Jesus is closely tied to the everyday wonders of nature that He experienced in His earthly journey.

"This Season of Creation, we strive to more deeply understand the lesson Jesus taught us through creation, to more authentically honor our Creator, and to share fellowship with brothers and sisters along the way. As pilgrims together, we welcome the opportunity to awaken anew to the wonder of the Earth, our common home, and to protect the web of life it shelters." (Season of Creation Guide, 2018)

Pope Francis: "Everything is related, and we human beings are united as brothers and sisters on a wonderful pilgrimage, woven together by the love God has for each of his creatures and which also unites us in fond affection with brother sun, sister moon, brother river and mother earth". In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth....

RESPONSE: Litany for the Four Directions Written by Jay C. Rochelle, 1990

Leader: Let us give thanks for the East, for the ancient hills and valleys and streams without end, for the green Atlantic from the reaches of Maine to the Florida Keys, for larch and hemlock, for black bear and mountain trout, for cardinals and eastern bluebirds.

Response: We bless you, O God, for the east.

Leader: Let us give thanks for the West, for soaring mountains and searing deserts, for waters roaring into the Pacific Ocean, for Columbia River salmon, snow buntings and western meadowlarks, for ponderosa and Jeffrey pine, for the mists of the Oregon coast and for the Olympic peninsula:

Response: We bless you, O God, for the west.

Leader: Let us give thanks for the North, for the bright band of prairie and wheat fields stretching across the land, for the Jayhawk and the loon, for the badlands of the Dakotas and the lakes of Minnesota, for northern pike and steel eye, for winding two-land blacktops in the heart of Wyoming.

Response: We bless you, O God, for the North

Leader: Let us give thanks for the South, for the broad Mississippi delta and the great Smokey Mountains, for the bayous of Louisiana, for magnolia trees, for kiskadee and egret, for catfish and parrotfish and for the cotton and the colors on the sands and strands of the southland:

Response: We bless you, O God, for the South

From Pope Francis: "Care for nature is part of a lifestyle which includes the capacity for living together and communion. Jesus reminded us that we have God as our common Father and that this makes us brothers and sisters. Fraternal love can only be gratuitous, it can never be a means of repaying others for what they have done or will do for us. That is why it is possible to love our enemies. This same gratuitousness inspires us to love and accept the wind, the sun and the clouds, even though we cannot control them. In this sense, we can speak of a "universal fraternity". (Laudato Si # 228,)

Intentions: Response: O God, enlighten our hearts and remain with Your world.

Leader: We pray in thanksgiving for Mother earth in whom all life is rooted, for Brother Sun whose energy radiates life, for Sister Water who nurtures and revives us, and all creatures with whom we live and for whom we are called to till and keep this garden. **Response**

Leader: O God of the poor, help us to rescue the abandoned and forgotten of this earth, so precious in your eyes. Bring healing to our lives, that we may protect the world and not prey on it, that we may sow beauty, not pollution and destruction. **Response**

Leader: Pour out your love upon us that we may protect life and beauty. Fill us with peace that we may live and

work as brother and sister to renew the face of the earth in this season of creation.

teach us to contemplate You in the beauty of the universe, for all things speak of You. Awaken our praise and

thankfulness for every being that You have made. Give us the grace to feel profoundly joined to everything that is.

for not one of them is forgotten in Your sight. Enlighten those who possess power and money [us] that they [we] may avoid the sin of indifference, that they [we] may love the common good, advance the weak, and care for this world in which we live.

Possible Additional Actions:

Pray daily during this Season of Creation for those most affected by climate change: the poor, climate refugees, victims of hurricanes, fires, volcanic eruptions, the underdeveloped countries, etc.
